Lee Abbey Conference 2017

God, Each Other and the World

Following the first ever joint conference held for participants of the recognised, acknowledged and emerging religious communities associated with the Church of England in Whitby two years ago, this second gathering built on the relationships established in the first conference. In many ways the week felt like a natural coming together of what Bp David Walker called 'a Community of Communities'. It has been an exciting time for mutual exploration and understanding, breaking down misconceptions, misunderstandings and cynicism between new and traditional religious communities. It has been a great success and synthesis of challenge and encouragement for all those who attended.

At times people expressed their pains, joys and fears, with a strong sense of a shared vocation to see the renewal of the traditional communities with new vocations and refreshed vision, alongside the emerging communities that tend to be more missional in nature, seeking to open up the Christian contemplative life and radical community to those who have written off Christianity as having no relevance or anything to say to the struggles of the 21st century. What seemed common to all was the importance of Benedictine, Franciscan and Ignatian spirituality, and the profound importance of silence.



Sr Mary John spoke with great wisdom unpacking the three different levels of love. Her wisdom spoke of great experience, and this framework became crucial for much of the content of the week. Lee Abbey and its emerging religious community which itself is going through the Acknowledgement process, proved a great venue and wonderful hosts. There were so many special moments, that it is hard to convey. For me these included a Eucharist above the beach with an altar made of local wood and stones from the beach, a final compline around the fire outside, pilgrimage walks that included swimming - that's a number of nuns and participants of the newer communities swimming - the monks weren't so brave!!

I came away deeply encouraged, and it was wonderful to see the barriers between new and existing religious communities breaking down, which I



believe to be the work of the Holy Spirit. The words of Mark Berry of the CMS Community remain ringing in my ears that I hope were deeply heard when he said 'discipleship - becoming a follower of Jesus means two things; to walk in the way, the footsteps of Jesus - to orientate our lives to the direction of his living - we adopt his purpose, his desire, his vision. Secondly to assume the posture of Christ in our living, in the small things we say and do, in

the daily focus of our loving, in the choices we make. In this way Jesus gives us three loci of our discipleship - to love God, love one another and love our neighbour. Or in other words we are called to 'contemplative prayer, participative community and loving action' - this is a command from Jesus to all Christians'. Amen to that. I look forward to the next conference, where I hope we can go even deeper and hear more from the stories of renewal and homemaking from the traditional religious communities.

It was a busy, tiring few days, and the journeys were long, but each part contributed to a whole which was an inspiring and humbling experience. I am grateful to all who worked to make it possible.
